## PARANORMAL RESEARCHER STAN GORDON TO PRESENT "BIGFOOT" DISCUSSION AT LIGONIER VALLEY MUSEUM

Ligonier – The Southern Alleghenies Museum of Art at Ligonier Valley will welcome back renowned paranormal researcher Stan Gordon for a special "Bigfoot" presentation this spring. This year, Gordon will present "Strange Aspects of the Elusive Bigfoot" on March 21 and 22. The program begins at 6 p.m. and repeats both nights. Cost is \$5 per person. Gordon began investigating reports of Bigfoot sightings in Pennsylvania in the late 1960s. Since then, he has interviewed hundreds of witnesses who claim to have encountered these strange creatures. In this presentation, Gordon will share some of the strangest Bigfoot cases ever documented. Incidents involving Bigfoot and UFOs seen together, trails of Bigfoot tracks that suddenly stop and vanish, and possible government interest in these incidents are just some of the startling details you will learn about in this illustrated lecture. A question-and-answer period will follow the presentation, and Gordon will be available to meet with guests and will be signing copies of his books and DVDs.

Gordon has been researching UFO sightings and other mysterious events since 1959. He is the producer of the award-winning documentary "Kecksburg: The Untold Story" and is the author of three books. Gordon appears frequently on radio and television programs and has been seen on the History, Discovery, SyFy, Science, Travel and Destination America channels. He has been a frequent guest on the popular latenight radio talk show, Coast to Coast AM.
